Chief's Corner

Thank you for supporting East County Fire and Rescue. We serve 10,000 people over 60 square miles in the unincorporated areas of Vancouver, Camas and Washougal. We are a small but mighty organization, providing

better service than most agencies our size. Whether its terrain challenges, wildland fires or hazardous material spills – we have the skills and connections to save lives and property.

Emergency services are funded through two levies (one for fire and another for EMS) paid through property taxes. Over time, these levy rates fall as property values rise to limit the fire district to roughly the same amount of revenue per year plus a one percent increase as allowed by law.

The issue is that emergency call volumes – 52 percent higher since 2007—and even the rate of

inflation are higher than the one percent revenue increase we are allowed. Inflation alone is 3-4 percent per year. More calls mean added costs for personnel, apparatus, equipment, and needed supplies.

Voters approved a fire levy of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value in 2008. That levy rate has fallen to \$1.29 as of 2018. The Board of Fire Commissioners will discuss asking voters to return funding to \$1.50/\$1,000 to maintain emergency service levels for our community. We invite you to take part in two upcoming meetings July 3 or 17 at 6:30 p.m. at 600 NE 267th Avenue in Camas (98607).

East County Fire & Rescue Passes Audit

East County Fire and Rescue operates under a balanced budget and has passed all its independent audits by the state (www.sao.wa.gov).

We actively look for ways to save taxpayers money, such as applying for grants and paying cash for apparatus like this fire engine, to avoid interest payments. ??

We even paid loans off early and refinanced bonds, which saved our taxpayers almost \$250,000. We improved our community's



insurance rating, which reduced premiums for home and business owners. We also partner with neighboring agencies to save money on administrative and training costs.

Dear Mr. and Ms. Fennel.

This firm serves as general counsel to East County Fire and Rescue "ECFR." As you are aware ECFR responded to a structure fire on your property located at 2101 NE 375th Ave, Washougal WA on August 19, 2017. ECFR notified you in January of 2014 that your property was outside of the boundaries of the ECFR and that, absent annexation into the ECFR, you would be responsible for the costs of future responses.

Under Washington law, homeowners outside of an organized fire protection ECFR are required to pay the actual cost of the services provided. Revised Code of Washington Section 52.12.160(4)(a) and (b) provide as follows:

- (4)(a) The property owner or owners shall reimburse an agency initiating firefighting services on unprotected land outside its fire protection jurisdiction for actual costs that are incurred that are proportionate to the fire itself. Cost recovery is based upon the Washington fire chiefs standardized fire service fee schedule.
- (b) If a property owner fails to pay or defaults in payment to an agency for services rendered, the agency is entitled to pursue payment through the collections process outlined in RCW 16.500 or through initiation of court action.

ECFR provided you with the enclosed invoice (which is based on the referenced standardized fire service fee schedule) for services on 9-7-17, 10-9-17, 11-15-17, 12-13-17 and 2-2-18. To date, although ECFR was contacted by your insurance carrier, ECFR has received no contact from you and no payment from your insurance company. **This letter is intended to serve as your final notice.** If payment is not received on or before June 29, 2018, the ECFR will pursue recovery in the manner, and pursuant to the authority, set forth above.

POLICY:

The purpose of this policy is to delineate policies and procedures related to electronic communication acquisition and use by District officials, employees and volunteers.

District computer systems shall include but not be limited to, portable lap tops, personal workstations, server stations, phone lines, data lines, hardware, and all software purchased and owned by the District.

Computer Usage:

As a District official, employee or volunteer, you are likely to use computers extensively in duties and tasks related to the agency. In order to protect the agencies computer systems from viruses and ensure that the software used is compatible with the agencies computers only software acquired or approved by a department head may be installed on District computers. Before installing any software not acquired by the department, you must gain approval from the Chief or his designee, or the Information Technology manager.

Electronic Mail:

All electronic media should be professional and business-like. All E-Mail should be viewed as public communications and this media should only be used in a manner that would not be considered inappropriate in the workplace. Some examples of inappropriate communications would be ones that are sexual in nature, racial comments, religious or political solicitations, insubordinate comments or comments which violate confidentiality.

Internet Access:

The Internet provides a valuable tool for research, interaction, communication, and delivery of services.

Except as permitted herein for personal use, all approved internet usage within the department shall be relevant to the job which the user is expected to perform for the agency and to enhance the value, knowledge, or productivity of that job. Acceptable business use of the Internet will vary depending upon the nature of the employee's job. The following is a list of steps the department may take to limit or monitor employees' access to the Internet;

- 1. The agency reserves the right to monitor and block access to all inappropriate Internet sites.
- The agency reserves the right to inspect any and all files stored in public or private areas of the agencies computers and networks to assure compliance with this policy.
- 3. No software or file downloads via the Internet into the agencies computers without prior approval. The downloads will then become property of the district.

Personal Use:

Personal use of the Internet is acceptable. Employees may use their Internet facilities for non-business research or browsing during mealtime or other breaks, or outside of work hours, provided that all other usage policies are adhered to.

Expectation of No Privacy:

Employees should have no expectation of privacy, both internally and externally. Remember, all activities are traceable; E-mail or any Internet usage can be compared to sending a postcard through postal mail. Send only information you would not expect others to find objectionable.

The agency administration has the absolute right to examine all the electronic transactions at anytime similar to its rights to examine other aspects of an employee's job. While this does not imply management will look at Internet access files or information, the right to do so is reserved.

The agency will comply with reasonable requests from law enforcement agencies for logs, diaries and archives on individuals' Internet activities.

File Downloads:

No files will be downloaded with out prior approval. Files that are downloaded from the Internet may have viruses that may cause damage to the agencies computers. Users are advised to use caution when downloading files. This includes ensuring files originate from professional sites and downloading files needed in your course of work. All agency computers should be installed with virus protection software and all downloaded files should be scanned to prevent infection by harmful viruses. Also any executable files should not be downloaded with out Chief or his designee approval

Offensive Material:


The Internet has representations on it of all types of interests, business, education and discussions that occur in a worldwide society. It is possible to accidentally venture into material which you or others may find personally offensive or which violates laws. If that occurs you are expected to immediately back out of such a site and return to acceptable uses of the Internet per this policy.

DISTRICTS INTENDING TO ADOPT THIS RESOLUTION SHOULD CONSULT LEGAL COUNSEL PRIOR TO ADOPTING SUCH A RESOLUTION.

Pursuant or RCW 43.19.648 effective June 1, 2018 local governments may have to satisfy 100% of their vehicle and equipment fuel needs from electricity or biofuel. This Resolution would allow a fire protection district or regional fire authority to opt out of the requirement for vehicles or equipment frequently used for emergency response.

Note: RCW 43.19.648(2)(c) provides that prior to a local government executing its authority to exempt vehicles from statutory requirements the local government **must** provide notice to the department of commerce of the exemption. However, the Department of Commerce rules only require a notice to be filed when filing annual reports and annual reports are not required for local governments that use under 200,000 gallons of gas and diesel per year.



ALTERNATIVE FUEL EXEMPTION

WHEREAS the Washington state legislature has mandated that effective June 1, 2018, all local government subdivisions of the state are required to satisfy one hundred percent of their fuel usage for operating publicly owned vessels, vehicles, and construction equipment from electricity or biofuel; and

WHEREAS RCW 43.19.648(2)(c) authorizes local governments to elect to exempt police, fire, and other emergency response vehicles, including utility vehicles frequently used for emergency response, from the electricity and biofuel usage requirement; and

WHEREAS The District does not use 200,000 gallons or more of gasoline or diesel fuel on an annual basis; and

WHEREAS Pursuant to WAC 194-29-030(3), 194-29-040 and 194-29-080 the District is exempt the District from annual reporting requirements of RCW 43.19.648 and the emergency vehicle exemption notice requirement of RCW 43.19.648(2)(c)(ii).

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners has considered the current availability of alternative fuel technologies available for emergency response vehicles and has determined that such technologies are not currently available to cost effectively meet the demands emergency response vehicles and it is in the best interest of the District to formally exempt all District owned fire and emergency response vehicles from the electricity and biofuel usage requirements at the present time; and

- 1) Is a battery-only or hybrid electric vehicle equivalent to the vehicle you're looking to replace available either through state procurement or on the open market? If not, go to 2.
 - a) Does it meet your operational needs? Will it perform the required functions? If not, go to 2.
 - b) Can charging be accommodated on a routine basis (remember, charging infrastructure and creative fleet management can resolve most vehicle charging concerns)? If not, go to 2.
 - c) Compare the lifecycle costs of equivalent electric vehicles with the vehicle you'd otherwise procure. If the electric vehicles are more expensive, go to 2.
 - d) Purchase an electric vehicle.
- 2) Is a propane or natural gas vehicle (dedicated fuel or dual-fuel) or conversion package available that meets your operational needs? If not, go to 3.
 - a) Compare the lifecycle costs of propane or natural gas vehicles with the vehicle you'd otherwise procure. If the propane or natural gas vehicles are more expensive, go to 3.
 - b) Purchase a propane or natural gas-fueled vehicle, or convert an existing vehicle to propane or natural gas.
- 3) Are you purchasing a diesel vehicle? If not, go to 4.
 - a) If more than one option is available at the same price, purchase the vehicle with an engine warranty that covers the highest level of biodiesel use.
- 4) Consider leasing your gasoline vehicle in order to take advantage of new alternative fuel and vehicle technologies and associated cost-savings in a timely manner.

FUELS

- 1) Are you fueling a diesel vehicle? If not, go to 2.
 - a) Use a 5% biodiesel blend (B5) when the price is no more than 1% higher than #2 diesel.
 - b) Use higher biodiesel blends (e.g. B10, B20) to the level covered by engine warranties when the price is no more than 1% higher than #2 diesel (including cost of additives needed to ensure storage and performance).

- c) Use renewable diesel, or the highest available blend of renewable diesel and #2 diesel, when the price is no more than 1% higher than #2 diesel.
- 2) Are you fueling a flex-fuel vehicle? If not, go to 3.
 - a) Use flex-fuel when the price is at least 20% less than regular gasoline.
- 3) Are you fueling a natural gas vehicle? If not, go to 4.
 - a) Use renewable natural gas, or the highest available blend of renewable and conventional natural gas, when the price is competitive with conventional natural gas.
- 4) Are you fueling a propane vehicle? If not, go to 5.
 - a) Use renewable propane, or the highest available blend of renewable and conventional propane, when the price is competitive with conventional propane.
- 5) Local governments are encouraged to install electric vehicle charging infrastructure in all fleet parking and maintenance facilities, and incorporate charging into all new facility construction and substantial remodeling projects.
