1.0 POLICY:

It is the policy of East County Fire & Rescue to establish and utilize a Rapid Intervention Team(s) to protect Fire Fighters engaged in hazardous conditions.

2.0 PROCEDURE:

- 2.1 The Incident Commander shall follow the Clark County IMS (Blue Card) to establish a RIT as soon as possible into these events, but must have at least one interior qualified Fire Fighter assigned outside the hazard area (rescue situations: 2-in, 1-out) or at least two interior qualified Fire Fighters assigned outside the hazard area (non-rescue situations: 2-in, 2-out) prior to sending fire attack teams into structures with fire incidents occurring beyond the incipient phase. Examples of such events are:
 - 2.1.1 Structure Fires
 - 2.1.2 Haz Mat Incidents
 - 2.1.3 Trench Rescue Incidents
 - 2.1.4 Confined Space Rescue Incidents
 - 2.1.5 Any other incident posing significant risk to Fire Fighters
- 2.2 More RITs may be added due to the size of the building, number of access points used by crews, or complexity of the incident. Think about multiple RITs, if needed.
- 2.3 The IC shall establish a new RIT any time a current RIT is sent in. The IC shall request an additional alarm to provide adequate resources for both Fire Fighter rescue and incident stabilization.
- 2.4 A RIT shall consist of at least two(2) entry-level Fire Fighters immediately available for the rescue of other Fire Fighters. Consider two teams of two Fire Fighters for more options. As manpower allows, or when the incident grows to a 2nd or greater Alarm, raise the minimum RIT staffing to four(4) Fire Fighters.
- 2.5 Fire Fighters assigned to a RIT (first team "On-Deck") will:
 - Be ready to immediately enter a building and perform a rescue
 - Have SCBA donned, with mask hanging around neck in the standby mode
 - Be with the IC at the command Post, or where assigned
 - Be closely monitoring radio traffic to know the status of crews on the scene (interior, ventilation, search & rescue, etc.).
 - Respond only when assigned by the IC
 - Have with them the minimum equipment listed below:
 - o RIT Bag
 - Spare Radio on MAYDAY channel
 - o Forceable entry tools (halligan and flathead axe)
 - Tools to stage as time permits:
 - Silver Tarp
 - Dedicated Hose Line
 - Extrication Tools (power saws, flashlights, long tools)
 - Ladder
 - Other equipment required by Incident Commander

- **2.1** East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR) shall establish, supervise, maintain, and enforce, in a manner which is effective in practice:
 - 2.1.1 A safe and healthful working environment, as it applies to both nonemergency and emergency conditions.
 - 2.1.2 An Accident Prevention Program as required by WAC 296-305-01509(1)(b)
 - **2.1.3** Programs for training employees in the fundamentals of accident prevention.
 - 2.1.4 Procedures to be used by the District Health and Safety Officer and Incident Commander to ensure that emergency medical care is provided for members on duty.
 - 2.1.5 An Accident Investigation program (See Policy 20.7.2)
 - A Policy that clarifies "rules of engagement' or parameters when personnel should commit to work activities within a hot zone. (See policy 30.1.2)
 - A policy that describes the right of every employee/member to notify Command of potential life-threatening situations during emergency operations and describe how this notification should occur. (See Policy 30.1.2 and SOG 314)
- 2.2 The District shall be responsible for providing suitable expertise to comply with all testing requirements. Such expertise may be secured from within the fire department, equipment and apparatus manufacturers, or other suitable sources.
- 2.3 Members/employees who are under the influence of alcohol or drugs shall not participate in any Fire District operations or other functions. This rule does not apply to persons taking prescription drugs as directed by a physician or dentist, providing such use does not endanger the employee/member or others.

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- 2.4 A bulletin board or posting area exclusively for Health and Safety information and posters shall be provided in each station and include WISHA (Washington Industrial Safety and Health Act) form F416-081-000 and all other required posters.
- 2.5 ECFR shall maintain a Hazard Communication Program which will provide information to all members and employees relative to hazardous chemicals or substances to which they are exposed, or may routinely be exposed to, in the course of their employment.
- 2.6 ECFR shall assure that all members/employees are physically capable of performing duties that may be assigned to them.
- 2.7 Members/employees with known physical limitations shall not be permitted to participate in physically demanding activities unless they have been released to participate in such activities by a physician or other licensed health care professional who is qualified to evaluate firefighters.

2.0 POLICY

- 2.1 It is the policy of East County Fire and Rescue to provide its employees with a safe and healthful work environment. The policies and guidelines in this Accident Prevention Program are designed to reduce or prevent employee occupational injuries or death.
- 2.2 The District shall develop, implement, and maintain a written safety program. District safety programs shall have an assigned Health and Safety Officer.
- 2.3 The District shall also develop a formal accident prevention program tailored to the needs of the department and hazards involved.
- 2.4 The Health and Safety Officer will be responsible for ensuring that members/employees are trained, knowledgeable of, comply with, and follow the Accident Prevention/Health and Safety program.
- 2.5 The District shall develop a safety orientation program which describes the District's safety program and includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - **2.5.1** How and when to report injuries, including instruction as to the location of first-aid facilities.
 - **2.5.2** How to report unsafe conditions and practices.
 - **2.5.3** The use, care, selection and maintenance of required personal protective equipment.
 - **2.5.4** The proper actions to take in event of emergencies including exit routes from all areas.
 - 2.5.5 Identification of the hazardous gases, chemicals or materials involved, along with the instruction on the safe use and emergency action following accidental exposure.
 - **2.5.6** Description of the District's total Accident Prevention/Health and Safety program.

- 2.5.7 An on-the-job review of the practices necessary to perform the initial job assignments in a safe manner.
- 2.6 The District shall have a safety committee to serve in an advisory capacity to the fire chief. The number of employer-selected members shall not exceed the number of employee-elected members.
- 2.7 The frequency of safety meetings shall be determined by the safety committee, but shall not be less than one hour per calendar quarter.
- 2.8 Minutes shall be taken of all safety meetings. After review by the chief or his/her designee the minutes shall be conspicuously posted at all stations.
- 2.9 Employee submitted safety suggestions or complaints shall be considered. Action recommendations by the committee shall be transmitted in writing to the fire chief. The chief or his/her designee shall reply to the submitter within 72 hours of receipt.
- 2.10 Inspections of fire stations shall be made at least monthly and records maintained centrally to ensure that stations are reasonably free of recognized hazards. These inspections shall include, but not be limited to, tools, apparatus, extinguishers, protective equipment, and life, health and safety equipment.

WAC 296-305-01501 **POLICY**It is the policy of East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR) to provide and operate with the highest possible levels of concern for the health and safety of its members. Our primary considerations are the prevention and reduction of accidents, injuries, and occupational illnesses. This policy applies to all members and other persons who may be involved in District activities. Members must report work-related injuries or illnesses to their immediate supervisor before the end of his/her duty period, but not later than twenty-four hours after the incident.

- 2.2.1 Exception: In the event that symptoms of an occupational injury or illness are not apparent at the time of the incident, the member shall report the symptoms to a Chief Officer within forty-eight hours after becoming aware of the injury or illness.
- 2.3 A report shall be made within eight hours after a fatality, or probable fatality, of any firefighter or member from a work-related incident, or the inpatient hospitalization of any member as a result of a work-related incident. The Fire Chief or District Health and Safety Officer shall orally report the fatality or hospitalization, in person, to the nearest office of the Department of Labor and Industries; or by telephone to 1-800-423-7233. Item 2.3 applies to each such fatality; or hospitalization which occurs within thirty days of the incident.
 - 2.3.2 Exception: If the Fire Chief or District Health and Safety Officer does not learn of a reportable incident at the time it occurs and the incident would otherwise be reportable under subsection 2.3.1, a report shall be made within eight hours of the time the incident is reported to a member of the District.

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- 2.4 Each report required due to a fatality, probable fatality, or inpatient hospitalization shall relate the following information:
 - 2.4.1 Establishment Name
 - 2.4.2 Location of the incident
 - 2.4.3 Time of the incident
 - 2.4.4 Number of fatalities or hospitalized members
 - 2.4.5 Contact person
 - 2.4.6 Phone number
 - 2.4.7 A brief description of the incident
- 2.5 The District shall maintain records of occupational injuries and illnesses. Reportable cases include every occupational death; every occupational illness; or each injury that involves one of the following:
 - 2.5.1 Unconsciousness
 - 2.5.2 Inability to perform all phases of regular duty-related assignment
 - 2.5.3 Inability to work full time on duty
 - 2.5.4 Temporary assignment
 - 2.5.5 Medical treatment beyond first-aid
- 2.6 The District shall record occupational injury and illnesses on OSHA 300 Log of Work-related Injuries and Illnesses and OSHA 300A Summary of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses.
- 2.7 The District shall post an annual summary of occupational injuries and illnesses on each station's Health and Safety bulletin board. This summary shall consist of a copy of the year's totals from the Form OSHA 300A and the following information from that form: Calendar year covered, company name, establishment name, establishment address, certification signature, title, and date. If no injuries or illnesses occurred in the year, zeros must be entered on the totals line. The summary shall be posted no later than February 1st each calendar year, and shall remain posted until April 30th.

3.0 RESPONSIBILITY

- **3.8** The Health and Safety Officer will ensure the reporting and recording-keeping of injury and illnesses.
- 3.9 All members will comply with injury and illness protocols.

2.0 POLICY

- 2.1 After emergency actions have been completed following incidents that cause serious injuries (with immediate symptoms) or exposure to occupational disease-causing chemical or physical agents, a preliminary investigation of the cause of the incident shall be conducted. The investigation shall be conducted by a person designated, as qualified by the District. The findings of the investigation shall be documented for reference at any time following formal investigations.
- 2.2 Equipment involved in an accident resulting in an immediate or probable fatality, shall not be moved until a representative of the Division of Occupational Health and Safety at the Department of Labor and Industries investigates the accident and releases such equipment, *except* where removal is essential to prevent further accident. When necessary to remove the victim, such equipment may be moved only to the extent of making possible such removal.
- 2.3 Upon arrival of the Department of Labor and Industries' investigator, the Health and Safety Officer or designee shall assign as many personnel as are deemed necessary to assist the Department of Labor and Industries in conducting the investigation.
- 2.4 The District shall preserve all records, photographic materials, audio, video, recordings, or other documentation concerning an accident.

3.0 RESPONSIBILITY

- 3.1 The duties of the Health and Safety Officer include ensuring that all reportable accidents are investigated and reported.
- 3.2 The Health and Safety Officer will be responsible to define corrective action and shall ensure that accident reporting procedures are initiated, as necessary, per District policy.

4.0 GUIDELINES

4.1 The purpose of an investigation is to find the cause of an accident and prevent further occurrences, not to fix blame. An unbiased approach is necessary to obtain objective findings.

- **4.2** Interview the injured party and available witnesses, as soon as possible, to determine the following:
 - **4.2.1** Circumstances preceding and surrounding the incident -- what were underlying and contributing causes, as well as immediate causes?
 - **4.2.2** What physical hazards existed at the time of the accident, such as unprotected openings; or housekeeping, slippery surfaces, protruding nails, etc.
 - **4.2.3** Were defective tools, equipment or materials provided to workers -- or were they improperly used?
 - **4.2.4** Was personal protective equipment provided; was PPE defective, not used, or used improperly?
 - **4.2.5** Did unsafe work practices contribute to the incident, including improper lifting or handling of materials?
 - **4.2.6** What Health and Safety rules or Health and Safety training might have prevented the accident?
 - **4.2.7** What unsafe conditions or unsafe actions were caused by a third party, i.e., another agency or a contractor?
 - **4.2.8** If possible, interview injured individuals at the scene of the accident and "walk through" a re-enactment. Be careful not to repeat the act that caused the injury.
- 4.3 Witnesses should be interviewed one at a time. Talk with anyone who has direct knowledge of the accident, and/or conditions, even if they did not actually witness the incident.
- **4.4** Record names, addresses and statements of witnesses. Consider taking signed and dated statements if facts are unclear or an element of controversy exists.
- **4.5** If a third party or defective product contributed to the accident, save any evidence. It could be critical to the recovery of claim costs.
- **4.6** In major incidents, use sketches, diagrams and photos to document details graphically. Take measurements when appropriate.
- **4.7** Define corrective actions that should be taken to prevent re-occurrence. Time tables must be established as to when the corrective action must be completed. Every investigation should include an action plan.

East County Fire & Rescue personnel, equipment and/or apparatus shall not be used in activities related to quelling mob action unless such action is specifically authorized by the Chief of the Fire District.

The Fire Chief shall be the judge of the degree of Fire District participation, and possible implementation of civil disturbance procedures, during any such activities.

Members in areas not affected by civil disturbance activities will continue with their normal duties/activities.

First arriving unit, when encountering a situation classified as a civil disturbance, will notify CRESA in normal size-up manner—or via an Update. Dispatch will be directed to notify all Emergency Responders of the situation. Fire District responders are to stage, if the situation is deemed to be a hazard. When responding to a 911 emergency that is deemed a hazard, Dispatch will notify Fire District personnel to stage until Law Enforcement is on the scene and it is deemed 'safe' for Fire District responders to enter. Law Enforcement will also be notified, if not already on the scene.

If the situation escalates and Fire District personnel need to leave the scene, they shall withdraw immediately notifying Command at their earliest possible convenience. Members are not obligated to take Fire District equipment or apparatus when withdrawing from unsafe situations. Members are allowed to undertake all reasonable means to protect themselves when withdrawing from a dangerous situation.

Iliana,

Sorry for the delay in responding.

Initially I would note that the City may not have legal authority to condemn fire district property that is already being used for a public purpose. That is actually a fairly complex issue but if the District was opposed to selling a part or all of the property, we could research the issue in more detail and provide a formal opinion on this issue to determine whether the City would likely have any success in condemning the property.

If the District is willing to sell all or a portion I think the appraisal is the critical first step and the appraisal should provide you with the value of the three parking spaces, the value of the entire lot and the value of the lot without the three parking spaces. Once you have an idea of the values, the Board could properly respond to the City with either: 1) We are not interested and we need the full parcel to provide fire services; 2) We are interested make an offer on the three parking spaces or 3) we are only interested in selling the entire parcel to the City.

I recognize this is a fairly general response so if there are any specific questions or concerns or if the Board wants a more formal analysis of the condemnation issue, please let me know.

Mike the process for condemnation begins with the city getting an appraisal for the property we need to acquire for the road project. After we get an appraisal, which would also include damages from the loss of property, we would meet with you to make an offer on the property. You can accept the offer, reject the offer, or get your own appraisal, if you feel the offer is not enough, or the damages are more than our appraiser has indicated. If your appraiser comes up with a different value, we would see if both parties can agree on a price.

If you don't want to sell the property needed for the road project, we would go to a judge and get the process started for condemning your property for a beneficial road use. After it is completed, you would still get your appraised value paid out to you, but the lawyers involved would also get paid to complete the eminent domain proceedings (condemnation).

Let me know if you have other questions regarding process. I myself have never gone through condemnation proceedings, but I know our city attorney has.

East County Fire and Rescue is proud to be your emergency services provider. We serve 10,000 people over 60 square miles in the unincorporated areas of Vancouver, Camas and Washougal.

We have spent the past several months educating our community about challenges we are facing to maintain emergency service levels. Call volumes have increased 52 percent since 2007, and revenue is not keeping up with the demand for service. The fire district is limited to a one percent revenue increase per year while inflation alone is approximately 3-4 percent.

Voters will have the chance to restore funding for emergency services by returning the fire levy to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Voters originally approved a fire levy of \$1.50 in

2008. Since then, our levy rate has fallen to \$1.29. (Levy rates fall as property values rise, which limits the fire district to roughly the same amount of funding each year.)

If approved by voters, the cost would be an additional 21 cents per \$1,000 (or \$7.87 per month for the owner of a \$450,000 home). Funding will be used to maintain emergency service levels and our community insurance rating. This rating is linked to the amount home and business owners pay for insurance premiums.

October 7-13, 2018 was Fire Prevention Week. This year's theme was "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere." The campaign works to educate people about three basic but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire—and how to escape safely in the event of one.



The first step is to "LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and resolve them.



Next up, "LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your predetermined meeting place outdoors, ould be a safe distance from the home

which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.



"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

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Training for Aviation Emergencies

Having the Port of Camas/Washougal Airport in our service area encourages commerce and provide recreational opportunities. While beneficial, this facility does present its own set of risks and we have been fortunate to have the Camas Washougal Aviators (CWAA) assist us in preparing for an emergency involving small aircraft.

All of our firefighters have been trained in how to respond to an crash, fire, medical emergency, or fuel spill. Each year, they are refreshed on this specialized training, as well.

In fact, we spend a lot of training throughout the year! East County Fire & Rescue has a total of 40 members who attend about 1,050 different training sessions throughout the year. On a yearly basis, our firefighter and emergency medical technicians record about 2,500 hours of training in a wide range of firefighting disciplines.




Additionally, the CWAA has provided our firefighters an opportunity to visit an airplane hanger and to orient within the interior of planes. Dr. Steven Sachs, a pilot member of CWAA, has coordinated two classes for our firefighters on how to shut down a plane in an emergency. In a perfect world, we'd never have to use this training in real life, but this hands-on practice enhances our training and preparedness in the event of an aviation emergency. What's on my election ballot?

East County Fire and Rescue is asking voters to return the fire levy to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Why is my fire district asking for this?

Emergency call volumes have increased almost 52 percent since 2007. More calls mean added costs for personnel, apparatus, equipment and supplies. In contrast, the fire district is limited to a one percent revenue increase per year, which is not even keeping up with inflation.

How much will it cost?

The lid lift would be an additional 21 cents per \$1,000 (or \$7.88 per month for the owner of a \$450,000 home).

Have voters approved \$1.50 fire levy before?

Yes, voters in East County Fire and Rescue approved a fire levy of \$1.50 in 2008. That levy rate has fallen to \$1.29/\$1,000 in 2018. Levy rates fall as property values rise to limit the fire district to roughly the same amount of revenue per year.

What will funding be used for?

Funding would be used to maintain emergency service levels, improve firefighter training, maintain facilities, and repair equipment and apparatus. These items are also necessary to maintain our community's insurance rating, which affects the insurance premiums that home and business owners pay.
